Facilities

The Don Bradford Bible College is located on the campus of Charity Christian Center Church. Classes are held in a section of the sanctuary that has been deemed as the DBBC Classroom. The classroom currently holds approximately 60 students and can be expanded to accommodate enrollment increases.

Curriculum

DEGREES OFFERED:

CERTIFICATE of Ministerial Studies – One Year Program: 30 total credit hours, minimum of 2.0 g.p.a required. Students enrolled in this program will participate in a recognition ceremony at the completion of this program.

ASSOCIATES OF DIVINITY (A.DIV.) in Christian Ministries – Two Year Program: 60 total credit hours, minimum of 2.0 g.p.a required. Students enrolled in this program will participate in a graduation ceremony at the completion of this program.

BACHELOR OF MINISTRY (B.MIN) in Spiritual Development – One Year Program: 120 total credit hours, 60 credit hours transferred from Associate Degree Program, resulting in 60 credit hours remaining in this program.

MASTER OF MINISTRY (M.MIN) in Spiritual Development – Bachelor's Degree required pre-requisite. One Year Program: 45 total credit hours.

DOCTOR OF MINISTRY (D.MIN) in Spiritual Development – Master's Degree required pre-requisite. One Year Program: 46 total credit hours.

Admission

Candidates demonstrating a strong Christian commitment, academic ability, moral character, personal integrity, and a desire to pursue a Christian education are considered for admission to Don Bradford Bible College. Admission may be denied for factors that would be detrimental or disruptive to the college or its students. The following are required for admission:

- Application
- Application Fee
- Program of Intention Form
- Statement of Ministry Goals
- Financial Agreement Signed
- Diploma (only if transfer credits are applicable)

The Don Bradford Bible College is a religious organization offering a Certificate Program, Associate, Bachelor, Master, and Doctoral Degree Programs. DBBC offers religious courses only and have been exempt by the Louisiana Board of Regents from offering Core Subject courses such as English and Math. Therefore, we do not require students to have a high school diploma in order to enroll in the Certificate or Associate Degree program.

Registration / Orientation Schedule:

Orientation Night will be held on the designated Tuesday or Thursday PRIOR to the first night of class. Attendance at orientation is a requirement. Books and class schedules will be issued on this night. Full payment or 1st payments are also due on Orientation Night.

Books & Materials:

Upon receipt of first payment for each semester, students will be issued the required books for each course on their schedule. This will occur on Orientation Night.

Students are required to bring their course book and a notebook to each class session. Other forms of note taking devices such as a laptop or IPad are acceptable. Highlighters or notecards are also suggested.

It is also highly suggested that all enrolled students have a working email address and access to the internet.

Financial Information

Financial Facts:

- 1. DBBC does not participate in governmental student loan programs.
- 2. Please ensure that you can commit to promptly pay your initial and monthly tuition payments.
- 3. There is a \$50.00 non-refundable application fee to be submitted with your application.
- 4. There is a \$75.00 Book Fee to be paid once admission is granted.
- 5. The total tuition cost (NOT including books) for each semester is:

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$700.00 – Associate Degree
$800.00 – Bachelor's Degree
$850.00 – Master's Degree
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\$900.00 – Doctoral Degree

The entire tuition fee can be paid in full on Orientation Night (\$50 discount) or it can be paid in 4 installments, with each installment due on the 1st Tuesday of each month, beginning with the first month.

Tuition Refunds

If a student drops or withdraws from any class or withdraws from the college, and has paid their tuition in full, then a refund of tuition during a fall or spring semester is made per the following schedule:

90% first and second weeks 50% third and fourth weeks 25% fifth through eighth weeks No refund after the eighth week

Non-attendance of classes does not constitute an official withdrawal or course drop. See "withdrawal" for detailed information.

Academic Expectations

Course Work / Assignments / Tests

Each instructor will distribute a course syllabus to students on the first night of class. The syllabus will include the course work required of each student to pass the course. Course work can include, but is not limited to: response papers, review questions, practical application, daily quizzes, weekly test, and a final exam.

Students are required to maintain a 2.0 grade point average.

Assignments are due on the date specified in the course syllabus. Late assignments may be accepted, with a score penalty, at the instructor's discretion.

Class Hours / Attendance

Class Hours:

All classes are held on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Class start times vary, depending on the class level. Undergraduates begin class at 6:30pm. Graduates begin at 6pm or 7pm. Please consult the instructor for your class time.

Class Attendance:

Students are expected to commit to attend all class sessions. There are excused absences, but only related to instances stated in the DBBC Handbook. It is expected that when a student is unable to attend class, he/she will email the class instructor as soon as possible to inform them of their absence. It is the student's responsibility to make up missed assignments, tests or quizzes. 80% attendance rate is required to pass the course.

Excused Absences

Absences will be granted in the following cases:

- Illness of student, student's spouse, or student's child (ren)
- Death in the family
- Emergency situations beyond the student's control

Students are required to contact the instructor to inform them of absence. Students will be given one class period to make up any missed assignments and must decide with the instructor to arrange a time to make up missed test.

Students who enroll after the start date are STILL REQUIRED to make up the assignments that were assigned during the classes that were missed.

Master's Degree Graduation Fee: \$200.00 Doctoral Degree Graduation Fee: \$250.00

Students who are simultaneously earning more than one degree will pay the initial graduation plus an additional \$50.00 each additional degree.

CERTIFICATE PROGRAM STUDENTS:

A Recognition Ceremony in May at the completion of the One-Year Program. A ceremony fee of \$50.00 will cover the student's ceremony package: invitations, certificate and cover, and ministry license. Portrait Packages are available for an additional fee (To be paid directly to photographer)

<u>Graduation fees must be paid two mon</u>ths prior to graduation.

<u>Withdrawal</u>

A student withdrawing from DBBC must initiate the process by completing paperwork in Registrar's Office. If a student leaves campus before going to the Registrar's Office, he or she must submit, in writing, a notice of withdrawal to the Registrar's Office. The date that the notice is received constitutes the official date of withdrawal, and all applicable financial and academic policies will apply. The last day to withdraw from DBBC is no later than the fourth week of instruction. Refer to the calendar for specifics.

Honors

The Academic Dean recognizes undergraduate students who carry at least 15 hours for credit in a semester, exclusive of pass/no pass courses, and who attain a grade point average of 3.50 or higher with no grade below "C." The President's honor roll recognizes undergraduate students who carry at least 15 hours for credit in a semester, exclusive of pass/no-pass courses, and who attain a grade point average of 4.00. A student doesn't appear on both lists, only on the higher one he or she qualifies for.

Graduating with Honors

Honors are determined for the commencement program and ceremony, for undergraduate students, based on the cumulative GPA for four (4) semesters. Honors on the diploma include the final semester of coursework for the degree and the grade earned on the portfolio.

Undergraduate Students who fulfill the degree requirements with cumulative grade point averages (GPAs) of at least 3.80 and earn grades of "A" or "B" on the portfolio receive the distinction **summa cum laude.**

Students with cumulative GPAs between 3.60 and 3.79 who earn grades of "A" or "B" on the portfolio receive the distinction magna cum laude.

Students with a cumulative GPA between 3.40 and 3.59 who earn a grade of "A" or "B" on the portfolio receive the distinction **cum laude**.

Transfer Credits

DBBC accepts courses from regionally accredited institutions. Regionally accredited means that an institution is accredited by one of the six regionally stipulated accreditation agencies approved by the U.S. Department of Education. DBBC also accepts credits from schools accredited by the Association of International Christian Colleges and Seminaries (AICCS). Technical or vocational courses are not ordinarily considered for transfer. No credit is given for any course with less than a "C" level grade. Transfer credits from institutions that are not regionally accredited may be accepted on the same basis they are accepted by the reporting institution in their own state.

A maximum of 15 semester hours may be transferred into DBBC from an accredited institution. The last 45 semester hours of a degree program must be taken at DBBC. Transcripts submitted to DBBC become the property of DBBC and are stored in students' permanent files. They cannot be copied or reissued except for oncampus advisement purposes, in which case the documents are delivered directly to academic departments.

ASSOCIATE DEGREE COURSES

BKT330: Breakthrough Thinking

A healthy renewed mind is one of the most powerful assets that a believer can have in this life. Developing the mind of Christ in our thinking patterns and behavior will release a supernatural sense of destiny of purpose and a sense of inner identity of knowing who we are in Christ. In this class, you will learn how to move with the Holy Spirit in quiet confidence. You can start to allow dreams and visions of the Holy Spirit to become an integral part of your thinking patterns and walk in the supernatural creativity of divinely inspired spontaneous thoughts.

BUS110; BUS220; BUS330; BUS440: Business Track (I, II, III, IV)

The courses in the Business Track are each anchored on Kingdom Principles of accessing financial wealth God's way. Explore solutions to financial problems and discover how what appears to be the worst times in the world's economic system, is an opportunity for God's people to invest in their financial education.

BUS-330: Poverty, Riches & Wealth by Kris Vallotton

This course provides a biblical perspective on financial stewardship, abundance, and generosity. Students will analyze the difference between poverty, riches, and true wealth while confronting limiting mindsets about money. The course emphasizes how Kingdom prosperity is rooted in generosity and freedom rather than accumulation.

COH440: Culture of Honor

In this class, the church is revealed as a place of freedom, respect and empowerment and healthy discipline (not punishment). A Culture of Honor challenges the status quo of church leadership structure and presents a refreshing view of the five-fold ministry. If those with power learn how to empower those around them, then surely it will come to pass that, "That kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven." You will learn to apply the truths revealed in this practical yet supernaturally charged set of principles to relationships in your family, workplace, community, ministry, church – wherever you deal with others. This class advocates a significant paradigm shift in church life, government, and relationships.

CON110: The Law of Confession

The Law of Confession is designed to develop and enhance the natural and spiritual truths associated with the cause and effect of WORDS that are spoken out of a person's mouth. Success and failure are in our WORDS. Controlling your words is one of the biggest challenges anyone will face in life; the Bible reveals that the power of life and death are in the words you say. When you begin to change the words you speak, you will rewrite your future and revolutionize your life.

EXP110; EXP220; EXP330; EXP440: Experiential Learning

In this course, students are required to complete a portfolio that reflects their life learning experiences that can be counted towards their degree. The purpose of this project is for students to summarize and evaluate experiences, both inside and outside of the ministry that contribute to building and shaping their Spiritual growth. Students must complete 3.0 credit hours of experiential learning each semester of their program. The maximum percentage of life leaning experience is up to 25% of the degree requirements.

FMG220: The Gifts of Ministries of the Holy Spirit (Fivefold Ministry Gifts)

The gifts of the Spirit can destroy any force the devil might use against Christians. In this course, you will discover that you are a candidate for the gifts of revelation, power, and inspiration. This course further discusses the purpose of ministry gifts, the devil's counterfeit, the weapons of our warfare, and the charismatic renewal.

GLR220: The Glory of God

Students enrolled in this course will personally develop a passion and thirst for God, be ignited by God's fire to do the "impossible", become a dynamic witness and see lives transformed, and confirm the gospel with supernatural signs.

HLD440: Inner Healing and Deliverance

Physical and Spiritual healing and deliverance are key issues for those who seek wholeness. This course will explore principles of healing in the mind and spirit while empowering boldness and faith to close the doors of the enemy and walk in God's healing power with miracles, signs and wonders.

MTP110; MTP220; MTP330; MTP440: Ministry Training Practicum

This course is designed to give students the opportunity to apply the knowledge gained in each course during the semester into real life situations. Students will exercise the Gifts of the Spirit in appropriate settings. Students are required to record various laboratory experiences in a portfolio.

PRO220: The Gift of Prophesy

In this course, students will have the opportunity to explore and deepen their understanding of what the Word of the Lord says about the gift of prophesy. Students will understand how to use the gift of prophecy (if applicable) and experience the demonstration of this gift.

SVT110: Servanthood – Key Leadership Quality

This course is a foundational course for roles in various areas of ministry. This course will set the tone for anyone serving or desiring to serve in the Ministry of Helps. With a focus on servanthood God's way, this course will develop and sharpen leadership skills with a Spirit of Excellence.

SPG-440: Supernatural Power of God

This class is designed to bring a clearer understanding of the supernatural power and authority of God is available for today's believers – just as they were during ancient biblical times – for healings, miracles, and deliverances. Experience God's anointing to be more effective in ministry, while understanding how to operate in the supernatural.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE COURSES

IS-____: Independent Study

This course provides students with the opportunity to earn academic credit for structured independent study in areas such as pastoral ministry, teaching, outreach, mentoring, leadership, and scholarly writing or readings. Under faculty supervision, students will design a plan of study that documents prior learning and current experiences, demonstrating how these contribute to their academic and spiritual growth. Two Independent Study courses are required each semester, allowing students to integrate real-life ministry and leadership experiences into their degree program.

MH-4800: Opportunities in Ministry

This course provides students with academic credit for active service/volunteer work in their current ministry, reflecting the biblical call to the Ministry of Helps (1 Corinthians 12:28). The course is required for two semesters and must be verified by a pastoral signature confirming ministry involvement and volunteer hours.

SD-3103: Revolutionary Revelation by Mark Hankins

In this course, students will examine the foundational role of wisdom and revelation in advancing God's call and unlocking spiritual authority. Hankins teaches that every breakthrough in faith, divine inheritance, and kingdom mandate comes through growing in the spirit of revelation and seeing with God's eyes. Students will be encouraged to pursue deeper revelation as the engine for personal and corporate spiritual breakthrough.

SD-3203: The Art of Prayer by Kenneth Hagin

This course provides students with a comprehensive study of prayer as a dynamic expression of faith. Drawing from Kenneth Hagin's teaching, students will examine various forms of prayer—such as supplication, intercession, and praying in the Spirit. The course equips students to reclaim a life of powerful, Spirit-led prayer.

SD-3300: The Radical Life of Grace by Creflo Dollar

In this course, students will explore the radical message of God's grace and how it transforms the believer's life. The text challenges works-based thinking and emphasizes the freedom found in unearned favor. Students will examine how grace reshapes faith, identity, and spiritual growth.

SD-3303: Shattering Strongholds by Liberty Savard

This course provides a practical exploration of spiritual freedom, teaching how believers can overcome bondage and live the abundant life Christ intended. Drawing from Savard's personal experiences, students will learn how to apply biblical principles of binding and loosing to dismantle strongholds in their lives and communities. The text's warm and approachable tone cultivates hope, clarity, and empowerment for long-term spiritual victory.

SD-3403: Battlefield of the Mind by Joyce Meyer

This course provides a transformational study in spiritual warfare, emphasizing the mind as the central battleground for faith and freedom. Students will learn how Satan uses negative thinking to disrupt lives, and how aligning thoughts with God's Word—through Scripture, gratitude, and positive meditation—leads to peace and purposeful living. Through personal anecdotes, biblical insight, and practical strategies, the book equips students to renew their minds and live victoriously.

MASTER'S DEGREE COURSES

Two Independent Study courses are required each semester, allowing students to integrate real-life ministry and leadership experiences into their degree program.

SD-6103: When You See the Invisible, You Can Do the Impossible by Oral Roberts

In this course, students will study how unseen spiritual realities become catalysts for miraculous outcomes through revelation-filled faith. Oral Roberts shares principles on recognizing God as the supernatural source, receiving His touch, and embracing revelation that unlocks divine power for extraordinary living. The course invites students to develop a vision that compels them to step into the seemingly impossible by faith.

SD-7203: Outrageous Courage by Kris & Jason Vallotton

This course provides a compelling biographical study of missionary Tracy Evans, whose life exemplifies radical faith and raw obedience in the face of danger. Through firsthand stories—from treating guerrillas as a captive to caring for 900 HIV-positive orphans—students will explore how extraordinary courage fuels transformative ministry. The course challenges students to reflect on their own willingness to live missionally and courageously.

THE-6105: Thesis I

This course recognizes master's candidates who have successfully completed and submitted the first half of their thesis by the end of the semester. Students will demonstrate progress through the development of a clearly defined research question, a comprehensive literature review, and the formulation of their research methodology. Credit is awarded to acknowledge significant advancement toward the completion of the master's thesis.

THE-7205: Thesis II

This course recognizes master's candidates who have successfully completed and submitted the final portion of their thesis. Students will demonstrate the ability to analyze data, present findings, and draw conclusions that contribute to scholarly research in their field of study. Credit is awarded upon the successful submission of the completed thesis in preparation for the final defense.

THE-6205: Thesis I Lab

This course provides master's candidates with structured faculty mentorship and peer collaboration as they begin developing their thesis. Students will refine their research question, conduct a literature review, and establish an appropriate methodology within a supportive, lab-based setting. Emphasis is placed on steady progress, critical feedback, and practical application of research skills.

THE-7210: Thesis II Lab

This course supports master's candidates as they complete, present, and defend their thesis. Students will finalize data analysis, prepare their written thesis for submission, and practice oral defense skills with guidance from faculty and peers. The lab setting fosters collaboration and ensures readiness for the final thesis defense.

DOCTORAL DEGREE COURSES

IS-____: *Independent Study* (**See Bachelor's Degree Courses)

Two Independent Study courses are required each semester, allowing students to integrate real-life ministry and leadership experiences into their degree program.

DS-8310: Dissertation I

This course recognizes doctoral candidates who have successfully completed and submitted the first half of their dissertation by the end of the semester. Students will demonstrate progress through a clearly defined research problem, an extensive literature review, and the establishment of their research methodology. Credit is awarded to acknowledge significant advancement toward the final dissertation.

DS-9410: Dissertation II

This course recognizes doctoral candidates who have successfully completed and submitted the final half of their dissertation. Students will demonstrate the ability to analyze data, present findings, and draw conclusions that contribute to original scholarship. Credit is awarded upon the successful submission of the completed dissertation in preparation for the final defense.

DS-8410: Dissertation Lab I

This course functions as a structured research lab where doctoral candidates receive ongoing faculty mentorship and peer support in the development of their dissertation. Students will actively workshop their research problem, literature review, and methodology while receiving feedback in a collaborative, lab-based environment. Emphasis is placed on sustained progress, scholarly collaboration, and the practical application of research skills toward the completion of the dissertation.

DS-9420: Dissertation Lab & Defense

This course serves as the culminating stage of the dissertation process, providing doctoral candidates with structured support as they finalize their research and prepare for the oral defense. Students will complete data analysis, present their findings, and refine their written dissertation under faculty guidance and peer collaboration. The course concludes with the successful defense of the dissertation, demonstrating scholarly mastery and readiness to contribute original research to the field.

SD-8303: Basic Training for the Prophetic Ministry by Kris Vallotton

In this course, students will be introduced to the biblical foundations and practical applications of prophetic ministry. Through interactive activities, reflection, and discussion, students will learn how to hear God's voice, deliver prophetic words responsibly, and bring encouragement to others. The course emphasizes accessibility of the prophetic gift to all believers.

SD-9403: The Prophet's Manual by John Eckhardt

In this course, students will engage with John Eckhardt's manual to gain practical and scriptural instruction for developing a prophetic gift. The text explores the difference between the prophetic gift and the office of prophet, outlines proper prophetic protocol, and emphasizes the role of character,

integrity, and timing in delivering accurate messages Students will also learn how to activate and sustain their prophetic calling while navigating common hindrances with humility and courage.
